



First Selectman's Corner

During the summer, the Miami Beach Association (“MBA”) informed the Town that it wants to make Pond Rd., between Hartford Ave. and Portland Ave., a private road for MBA residents during the period Memorial Day to Labor Day. They suggested the Town could construct a new road immediately north of Pond Rd. or the Town could construct a new road at the north end of the Town parking lot. The reason for this is that MBA residents with houses on the south side of Pond Rd. feel they are not part of MBA because they must drive to their houses using Sound View streets. We pointed out that in 1997, MBA and the Town signed a Settlement Agreement stipulating Pond Rd. would be used by the Town, but the MBA officials said their President at that time did not have proper authority to sign

the agreement, even though MBA was represented by a lawyer. There have been some discussions between the Town’s attorney and MBA’s current attorney, but there is no agreement at this time. If the Town were to create a new road, it would be very costly and the current arrangement has worked adequately for 25 years. This seems like a lot of activity without much accomplishment.

In late July, the beaches of Old Lyme were inundated with lots of driftwood that floated down the CT River following heavy rains. Most of the beach property owners and Associations dealt with debris that landed on their beaches but MBA insisted that the Town must remove the driftwood from its beach.



We confirmed that any debris above mean high water on a beach is the owner's responsibility and we also learned that, while the State of CT has jurisdiction of the beaches and water below mean high water, it will not remove the debris. Accordingly, we told MBA that it must remove the debris; not the Town. Further, if the Town removed the debris for one beach, it would surely be asked to do the same for other beaches.

The State of CT has mandated that all towns and cities must complete a multi-year Police Accreditation process. It involves three Tier Assessments (Tier 1 must be completed in Dec. 2023, Tier 2 in Mar. 2024 and Tier 3 in Mar. 2025). In addition, each Tier has a Proof of Compliance component (Tier 1 in Mar. 2026, Tier 2 in Mar. 2027 and Tier 3 in Mar. 2028). The Town has hired a consultant, Andretta Swift of Badge 6, LLC, to guide us and she is already hard at work.

The Town participated in our yearly Millstone Nuclear Plant exercise in August. Emergency Management Director, Dave Roberge, and the rest of the Emergency Operations Center staff dealt with a simulated nuclear event at Millstone that involved using tactical radios, siren activation, evacuation plans, dosimetry and more. While the exercise was non-evaluated, the Millstone observer said Old Lyme performed well.

The Hains Park driveway apron and ramp that services the boathouse was not installed properly when the boathouse was built, so Bob Dunn, Chair of Parks & Rec, Phil Parcak, former Facilities Director, and Ed Adanti, Superintendent of Public Works, researched what

improvements are needed. The proposal involves creating an inch and one-half lip on the new apron where it joins Route 1 and a humped ramp to stop most of the water from Route 1 from entering the park. The ramp will be shaped properly and will have a curb to direct water away from the basketball court. Weather permitting, the new apron and ramp will be installed in November.

Speaking of paving, the following roads were repaved this season: Beckwith La., McCurdy Rd. and Court, Old Shore Rd. Otter Rock Rd. and Rowland Rd. Hats off to Pasteryak Paving, Ed Adanti and the Public Works staff for their fine work.

The Old Lyme Food Share Garden at Town Woods Park and three other area food share gardens were honored by the United Way of Southeastern CT with its Innovation Award. Congratulations to Jim Ward and the many devoted gardeners who give their time to this worthy endeavor.

The 36-1 Buttonball Rd. Open Space parcel has new signage and a walking trail along the marsh has been mowed. The Harbor Management Commission will hire an engineer to draft a permit that will be submitted to the DEEP to approve an approximate 100-foot dock with a ramp leading to a small floating dock in Horse Neck Creek. The Open Space Commission is preparing to install a split rail fence along the marsh and the northern border to keep visitors off the marsh and private property.

Following the removal of several plantings the abutters of the Tantummaheag Landing placed on the Landing that obstructed vehicular access, they replanted some of them. The Town will

again have to take action and it is unfortunate that this matter could not be resolved in a satisfactory manner.

TOWN PROJECT UPDATES:

Halls Rd. Improvement Committee: AI Engineering of Middletown, CT has nearly completed the design work for the Bow Bridge over the Lieutenant River and the approaches to the bridge. Some Town officials had an on-site meeting with a number of staff from the CT DEEP to discuss the project. DEEP has offered to donate a 0.67 acre parcel it owns on the east side of the Lt. River (between the Hangry Goose restaurant and Route 1) to Town, with restrictions, and this would be helpful in providing access to the east side of the bridge. The DEEP is very focused on promoting fishing opportunities and public access to the river. The Town was awarded a \$28,500 CT Trails grant and we believe this may enable us access to a much larger grant to help fund the construction of the bridge. The Committee hosted two open house information sessions in the Town Hall to share information about the project.

Sound View Sewers: The CT DEEP announced the good news that Old Lyme “passed” an affordability standard and that a \$15 million forgivable loan will likely be approved. This loan, plus a 25% Clean Water grant, would not be allowed to exceed 50% of the eligible costs of the project. Assuming the forgivable loan is approved, the big question is what will the total of the bid amounts be? The answer will determine if the project can move forward. The Town and the three private beaches must also extend their agreements with the New London waste water authority. We are hopeful to have more definite news in early 2024.

Senior Center Building Expansion: The Senior Center closed its doors on September 30th and the staff relocated to the Old Lyme Town Hall for the duration of the project. The weekday meal site was moved to the Congregational Church and many of the Center’s other programs are being hosted at the Town Hall and other alternate locations. The Building Committee selected Newfield Construction as our Construction Manager and early December has been identified as the start of construction. The project will probably take about twelve months to complete.

Ferry Rd. Sidewalk Replacement: Because of a variety of delays, the project will likely be put out to bid at the end of this year with a start date to be late in the first quarter of 2024. Our engineer said the work is fairly straight forward and expects it will require about two months to complete.

Swan Brook Outlet: After some additional analysis, we believe there are no significant obstructions in the drainage pipes but the wind and wave action continue to cause sand to partially block or fully block the pipes. This is because the grade of the pipes is practically flat and the normal flow of water in Swan Brook is not adequate to flush the sand out of them. However, when there is a significant rain, the pipes run freely. As a result, we must monitor the sand level and, when it blocks both pipes, we will likely have to dig out sand in front of them to allow the water to flow.

STAFF NOTES:

May: Tracy Beatty was hired as the Assistant to the Finance

Director. She previously worked in an accounting office likes boating and lives in Old Lyme. After 35 years, Kathy Hall retired as our Building Dept. Admin. Asst.

June: Liz Hoffman was hired as our Building Dept. Admin. Asst. She lives in Town and is a dog lover.

July: Sheila McKinley-Bell was hired as a Human Resource consultant with a six-month contract. Ethan Kula graduated from the Police Academy, completed his Field Training and is now one of our certified Police Officers. Craig Bonatti was hired as our Land Use Technician to replace Kim Barrows who retired in September. Craig retired from the CT Dept. of Corrections.

August: Anita Mancini was hired to be our Finance Director. She came to us from North Branford, where she was the Asst. Finance Director. Anita also served in the U.S. Air Force.

September: Sam Barnes resigned as one of our Police Officers and is now working as a security officer in the Lyme Consolidated School. As noted above, Kim Barrows retired as one of our Land Use Technicians.

October: Ryan Sommers was sworn in as our newest Police Officer and began his six-month training at the Police Academy. We look forward to having him join the force in April of 2024.

On November 21st, my two-year term as First Selectman came to a close and I did not seek re-election as your First Selectman. I started as a member of the Board of Finance in 1982, served as its Chair for six years and left the Board in 1997 when I was elected First Selectman. I served seven terms until I was defeated in 2011. In 2013, I was elected to the Board of Assessment Appeals and in 2015 I was elected as the Treasurer of the Town. I served in the Treasurer position until 2019, when I was again elected First Selectman. It has been an amazing 29 years of elected service and I shall continue to serve on the Board of Assessment Appeals.

Some have asked “Why would anyone want to be First Selectman?” Obviously, there are times when the job is taxing, but there are also many stimulating and enjoyable aspects to the job. No day is the same as another because there are so many different things going on. On any given day one might deal with finances, a construction project, a police matter, animal control, storm preparation, land use and constituent issues, to name a few. I owe many thanks to my co-workers, past and present, for their help and counsel over the years. Their experience and competence are key to the smooth operation of our Town.

I also enjoy knowing and working with the many volunteers who give their time for the benefit of Old Lyme – emergency services, Boards, Commissions and Committees, non-profits, churches, schools, the Garden Club and many more. Our citizens make our community special and I have been blessed to have worked with so many of them over the years.

It has been a wonderful ride and, if I were asked if I would do it all over again, I most certainly reply yes.



Heating Assistance

Applications are currently being accepted for the **Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP)**, which may help income eligible households in paying for their heating costs during the winter months. Households are determined eligible based on state income guidelines. We are an intake site for residents of Old Lyme. Applications are then processed through TVCCA. Applicants may also apply online through the State of Connecticut Department of Social Services.

Old Lyme Social Services maintains an emergency fuel fund for residents who need immediate help or may not qualify for CEAP. We gratefully accept donations to this fund. Checks may be dropped off or mailed to the Town Hall.

The Social Services office also maintains a small emergency food closet at the Town Hall for any Old Lyme residents in need. Please consider donating any non-perishable food items, toiletries, and/or paper goods. A drop box for donations is located on the table outside of the main floor Meeting Hall at the Town Hall. All donations are greatly appreciated!

Upcoming Dates:

The following programs begin February 1, 2024

Elderly & Totally Disabled Tax Relief: In addition to meeting the income levels set by the State of Connecticut, applicants must be permanent residents of Old Lyme AS OF October 1, 2023, over 65 AS OF December 31, 2023 or meet the classification of totally disabled under the program guidelines. Application must be filed with the Assessor's Office between February 1 and May 15th 2024.

Additional Veterans: Applicants must be a resident of Old Lyme, the veteran's original copy of their Honorable Discharge (DD-214 Form) must be filed in the land records prior to October 1, qualify for the basic exemption and meet income limits set by the State of Connecticut. For income qualified applicants, an application must be filed with the Assessor's Office between February 1 and October 1st. Exemption maybe applied to home, auto or personal property tax.

Board of Assessment Appeals: Applications for the Board of Assessment Appeals will be available starting at the end of January. Applications must be filled out and returned the

Assessor's Office in its entirety on or before February 20th. The Board meets in the month of March dates to be determined.

The Town of Old Lyme has contracted with Municipal Valuation Services out of Fairfield, CT to conduct a town wide full physical revaluation for the Grand List year of October 1, 2024. During the coming months we will be mailing communications to all property owners, the revaluation teams will be conducting field reviews and inspections of all real property throughout the town. Tax Collector's Notice

Notice is hereby given the Taxpayers of the Town of Old Lyme that the second installment of a tax of 23.5 mills on the dollar laid on the grand list of October 1, 2022 is due January 1, 2024. Supplemental Motor Vehicle tax bills, which are mailed in December, also are due in full on that date.

Payments must be made on or before February 1, 2024 or postmarked by that date to avoid interest penalty. Partial payments are always accepted. If the tax or installment due is not paid within one month of the due date, the tax becomes delinquent and subject to interest at the rate of one-and-one-half percent (1-1/2%) per month. The minimum interest charge is two dollars. Interest charged on payments made after February 1 will be 3% (January and February). These interest rates, dates and charges have been set by Connecticut State Statute.

Please address questions pertaining to property assessments and exemptions to the Assessor's Office, 860-434-1605, ext. 218 or 219. For tax questions, please call Tax Collector at 860-434-1605, ext. 216 or 217.

The Real Estate Tax bills were mailed the last week of June 2023 (escrowed mortgage bills were sent to the bank or escrow firm) with return stubs for both first and second



installments. We do not mail a reminder of your January bill. However, you can view and print out a copy of it on our Town of Old Lyme website. See oldlyme-ct.gov, go to Tax Collector and click on the Check Payment Status button. Old Lyme Tax Collector accepts payments online; click on the gold Pay Taxes Online button. You will be directed to www.mytaxbill.org to see your property tax records and to submit payment online. Bank service fees are 3% for credit or debit card payments or \$ 0.50 for ACH or electronic check from a checking or savings account.

You also may pay in person at the Tax Office, Old Lyme Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme St., weekdays 9 am to 4 pm, drop off your payment in the Town Hall front door mail slot, or by mail: Old Lyme Tax Collector's Office, 52 Lyme St, Old Lyme, CT 06371.

Early Voting Begins in 2024

In 2022, Connecticut voters went to the polls and supported legalizing early in-person voting.

In 2023, the legislature was tasked with implementing the wishes of the majority of voters. The first year voters will have the option of early in-person voting is 2024 and here is a brief overview of some details.

The early voting period must be 14 days long for general elections, beginning 15 days before the election and ending two days prior. For primaries (except for presidential preference primaries) the early voting period must be seven days long, beginning eight days before the election and ending two days prior. For both types of contests, early voting locations must be open daily from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm, including weekends, except that (1) the locations must be open from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm on the last Tuesday and Thursday before the election, and (2) it is not offered on legal state holidays.



For special elections and presidential preference primaries, the law sets a four day early voting period. Specifically, the early voting period must begin five days before the election and end two days prior, except that it must be adjusted to exclude legal state holidays while still offering four days of early voting. Early voting locations must be open for these contests from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm on each day of early voting.

Early voting will not be offered for budget referendums or primaries for political town committees.

It will require the same identification requirements as normal in-person voting and a sealed envelope with a signed affirmation. The early voting location will be determined by each town.

Patience

Don't we all wish we had just a little more patience? And isn't it something we want very much to teach our kids? If only it was as easy as ABCs or memorizing a set of specific steps. It's so much more complicated, and yet, such an important skill to learn.

We worry about this in today's "instant" world, where every answer is a quick google away and Amazon delivers in 2 days, not 6 weeks. No time to cook? There's a choice of quick food delivery services.

Patience is associated with better emotional regulation and life satisfaction.

We can help our kids develop these skills by learning to take turns, manage frustrations, and learn to attend to something positive while waiting.

Play games that involve turn taking. Acknowledge frustrations during the game, and offer praise when your child shows patience. Teach simple ways of passing the time while standing in line - play I Spy or Rock, Paper, Scissors. Mark off days on the calendar to lead up to a birthday or vacation. Set a timer to show how long till snack time.

Most importantly, model the patience you'd like to teach! *Kids learn from what they see and experience from those they love.*

Transfer Station Information

TRANSFER STATION/LANDFILL HOURS. The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, **7:30 am-3:45 pm**, Saturday, **8:30 am-4:00 pm**. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.

Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station.

Residents can bring the following items to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road: computers (personal computers, mainframes, mid-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

Recycling Area:

No fees for the following items (with windshield sticker):
*Waste Oil *Motor vehicle batteries *Small appliances (no freon)
*Mattress & box springs *Covered and non-covered electronic devices *Fluorescent light bulbs *UPS (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

Fees apply for the following:

Tires: Auto w/no rim \$3 each, Auto w/rim \$4 each, Light Truck \$5 each, Heavy Truck/Race Car \$13 each, Construction Equipment \$100 per tire. No Retail or Wholesale Tire Outlets.

Upholstered furniture: Large \$10 per item, Small \$5 per item; Carpet 8x10+ \$10 per item; 8x10 or less \$5 per item; Appliances with Freon: \$10 each, Propane tanks: less than 20 pounds \$1; tanks 20 pounds (grill size) \$3, less than 20 pounds \$20 each.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles will be charged by weight at 6 cents per pound or \$120 per ton. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$5.

Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris.

Brush is charged on a per load basis with a \$5 minimum, 2 cents per pound or \$40 per ton. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.

Grass clippings are not allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and **cannot be deposited in your trash can**. Please compost on your property.

Leaves: No commercial leaf disposal is allowed; minimum charge is \$5; Pickup truck or small trailer charge is \$15; larger vehicles/trailers – Charge determined by Town personnel.
Resident must empty and remove paper or plastic bags.



Save the Sound

Save the Sound's September 16th Beach Cleanup Day at Rocky Neck State Park in support of International Coastal Cleanup (ICC) was a success!

Save the Sound's first Connecticut Cleanup Report highlights the scale and impact of litter in Connecticut and is intended to be a resource for helping change the way we consume single-use plastics and other disposables. The data in this report, which includes types of trash, number of pieces, and total weight, are used to advocate for policy change in Connecticut and beyond to stop trash at its source.

Cigarette butts, food wrappers, and small plastic pieces have been the top three most common trash types recovered by beach cleanup volunteers for the past six years.

The data also shows Styrofoam and balloons as persistent trash types on the ground and in the Sound. On average, Connecticut Cleanup volunteers collect more than 100 pieces of Styrofoam trash at each cleanup and more than 400 Mylar or rubber balloons each year.

All of these trash types pose serious threats to human and animal health, including ingestion, suffocation, and chemical leaching. Additionally, any plastic trash contributes to the growing abundance of microplastics as they break up into smaller and

smaller pieces that become increasingly difficult to remove from the environment. We recommend Old Lyme residents review this report and help us remove these hazards from our parks, rivers, and beaches. The full report can be found on Save the Sound's website at Beach Report Card – Save the Sound (www.savethesound.org).

Key findings of Save the Sound's 2023 Long Island Sound Beach Report include: 78% of Long Island Sound beaches earned an "A" or "B" grade. The biennial report included a list of the 10 highest scoring public beaches in New York and Connecticut based on a three-year average of water quality grades (10 each in NY and CT), and presented comprehensive grades for 207 swimming beaches 2020, 2021, and 2022. White Sands Beach in Old Lyme and Hole-in-the-Wall Beach in East Lyme both received an A+ rating.

Please help to preserve our region's threatened forests, islands, wetlands, river fronts, and beaches.

Lyme Old Lyme Food Share Garden

Lyme Old Lyme Food Share Garden volunteers delivered an eclectic mix of late-season produce to the Shoreline Soup Pantries & Kitchens site at the First Congregational Church of Old Lyme in October. In a confluence of seasons, sturdy turnips conjured thoughts of Thanksgiving, leafy Swiss chard reminded us that the spring cool weather growing season is not far off, and an erstwhile tomato rekindled fond memories of the abundance of August.

In 2023, LOLSG volunteers donated upwards of **800 hours** and **2,500 pounds of produce!** Volunteers installed a large **pollinator pathway** adjacent to the garden, cleared land, erected a fence and laid out rows for a substantial **garden expansion**, and composted more than **1000 pounds of food waste** collected at two donation sites.

Although it is bittersweet to tuck the beds in with a blanket of cover crops, the rest provides an opportunity to prepare for the next season. Thus, a primary focus of the winter is fundraising. Offseason donations enable the board of directors to plan creatively, which, in turn, allows volunteers to focus their efforts on gardening. The annual **Sponsor a Row** campaign kicked off in



October. The annual cost to maintain a garden bed from seed through delivery to a local food pantry is approximately \$250. All money goes directly towards the operating expenses of the garden, including seeds/transplants, fertilizer, weed barrier fabric, irrigation tape, electricity and tools. The LOLSG is immensely grateful to individuals, families, organizations and businesses who sponsor the garden. In appreciation, each \$250 donation will be recognized with a sign at the garden and on the LOLSG website. All donations from October 1, 2023 - March 31, 2024 will be recognized during the 2024 season. Smaller donations are very much appreciated as well.



Exploring Language and Culture in The Lyme-Old Lyme Schools

MEMORIZING vocabulary words and conjugating verbs is what many of us likely recall from high school language class. Much has changed in the way language is taught, from beginning study of a foreign language at a younger age to teaching language in more immersive ways.

Students in the Lyme-Old Lyme Schools begin Spanish in Kindergarten and continue through fifth grade. When they reach middle school, they have the option of continuing Spanish or transitioning to French. High school is where options widen, as students can choose from Spanish, French, Chinese or Latin. While one year of a foreign language is required by the State of Connecticut to graduate, most students continue their study of a language longer with many dabbling in multiple languages.

Language classes are taught with a focus on communication skills beginning first with the ability to speak and write the language, followed by a focus on the ability to listen, read and comprehend the language. Teaching varies slightly by language, particularly with Chinese and Latin given their unique structure.

When high school students enter their Spanish classrooms, they are transported to a new locale where only Spanish is spoken. Class is structured around themes such as family and culture, technology, and global challenges and examine these themes across different Spanish speaking countries. The language is absorbed and learned through a variety of lessons including videos, which may include popular comedies pulled from Netflix, or a documentary in Spanish that examines an issue discussed in class.

The first years of Chinese are spent learning how to converse, with later classes focused on learning to read and write Chinese characters. Chinese is one of the most difficult languages to learn because of the complexity of learning tens of thousands of Chinese characters.

Latin is taught by a reading method in which you use Latin and pictures to define words you see. Units are divided by topic including the Roman Empire, Roman money, trade and other topics with history and mythology woven into most lessons.

Field trips to places like Chinatown in New York City round out student experiences as do language clubs and honor societies.

Students may test for The Seal of Biliteracy beginning their junior year. This award recognizes students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages by high school graduation.

Historic District Commission

IT WAS ANOTHER BUSY SUMMER in the Historic District! The season began with hundreds viewing a beautiful Memorial Day parade, followed by Music on Lyme Street, the Midsummer Festival, and a concert and ice cream social on the Town Green. Lymes' Youth Services Bureau sponsored a 5k run, the library hosted a music and poetry program on its lawn to recognize the installation of new Witness Stones, and the town launched spectacular fireworks at the high school. The Fire Department celebrated its centennial over a July weekend with food, music, an antique car show, vintage fire trucks, and a visit from the "Never Forget Mobile Exhibit." We await the excitement of hundreds of families and children on Halloween and upcoming holiday festivities before life quiets down for winter. However, with two museums, one nature center, an inn and jazz club, an active art

academy, two busy child-centered non-profits, three schools, the Fire Department, the Town Hall, the library, many small businesses, and a vibrant church community, plus a stream of walkers, Lyme Street continues to draw neighbors and visitors throughout the year.

This year the Historic District Commission reached out to property owners to communicate our shared goals for the District. It updated both its photographic record of properties and the forms required for external changes to structures within the District. The Commission processed a record 36 projects; continues to research and support a town-wide Historic Plaque Program; and reviewed and endorsed the addition of Griswold Point to the National Register of Historic Places. The HDC continues to work on an updated signage policy and is reviewing lighting guidance to align with, and refine for the District, new Connecticut River Gateway Commission provisions adopted by the Zoning Commission this past spring.



Old Lyme's Horseneck Creek Landing

A three-acre town-owned property located at 36-1 Buttonball Road, named "Horseneck Creek Landing" by the Board of Selectman, is open to the public.

Signs on the street mark the entrance. Parking and a short walking trail are available. Please respect private property owners when visiting.

Horseneck Creek Landing contains a beautiful sampling of coastal forest, a threatened and important natural habitat. According to UConn, coastal forests are subject to a maritime climate (generally cooler summers and milder winters than inland locations) but don't receive salt spray (as a true maritime forest may).

Species growing along the trail include black, red and white oak, highbush blueberry, northern bayberry, groundsel tree, black huckleberry, eastern red cedar, big-tooth aspen and big-leaf marsh elder.


Horseneck Creek is also bordered by salt marshes, home to a diverse range of wildlife from crabs to migratory birds. Healthy salt marshes

support fish populations and mitigate the impact of coastal flooding.

Visitors may see a variety of wildlife, and the location is wonderful for birding. Osprey, egrets, cormorants, and great blue herons are common before some species migrate south in the fall. Colder weather brings brant and various ducks, including brightly colored hooded mergansers. Bald eagles may be spotted, and DEEP reports that seaside sparrow and saltmarsh sharp-tailed sparrows, state-listed birds, may be in the area.

Visitors should stay off fragile tidal wetlands to avoid possibly disturbing threatened plant and bird species (and where one can quickly sink into deep mud). Horseneck Creek Landing is open from sunrise to sunset.

The property is cooperatively managed by the Open Space Commission and the Harbor Management Commission. In the future, Open Space will offer additional upland visitor amenities focusing on education. Harbor Management will seek approval and funding to construct a kayak dock allowing access to the Black Hall and Connecticut Rivers.


