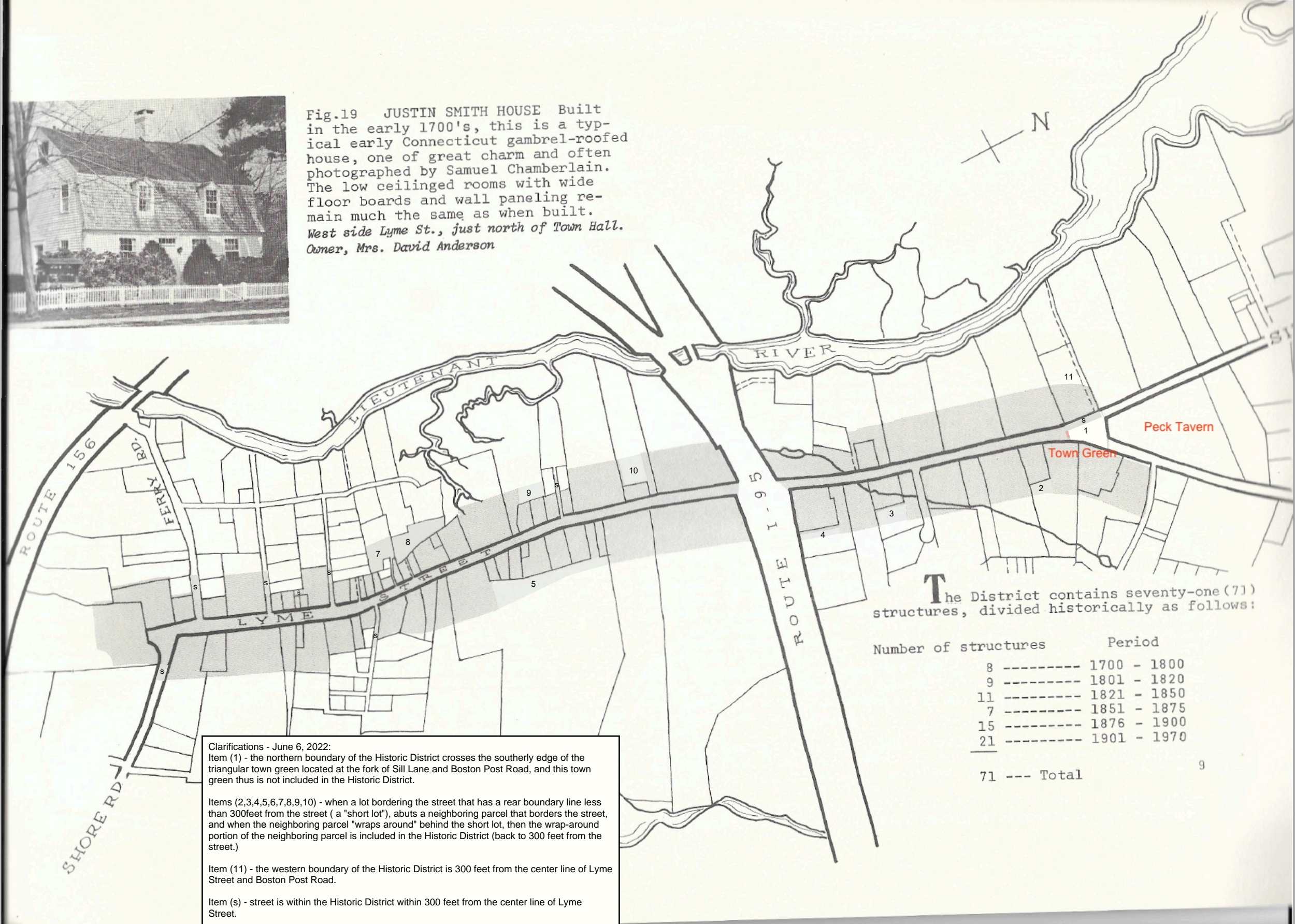




Fig.19 JUSTIN SMITH HOUSE Built in the early 1700's, this is a typical early Connecticut gambrel-roofed house, one of great charm and often photographed by Samuel Chamberlain. The low ceilinged rooms with wide floor boards and wall paneling remain much the same as when built. West side Lyme St., just north of Town Hall. Owner, Mrs. David Anderson

Clarifications - June 6, 2022:

Item (1) - the northern boundary of the Historic District crosses the southerly edge of the triangular town green located at the fork of Sill Lane and Boston Post Road, and this town green thus is not included in the Historic District.

Items (2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10) - when a lot bordering the street that has a rear boundary line less than 300feet from the street (a "short lot"), abuts a neighboring parcel that borders the street, and when the neighboring parcel "wraps around" behind the short lot, then the wrap-around portion of the neighboring parcel is included in the Historic District (back to 300 feet from the street.)

Item (11) - the western boundary of the Historic District is 300 feet from the center line of Lyme Street and Boston Post Road.

Item (s) - street is within the Historic District within 300 feet from the center line of Lyme Street.
