

At the Annual Town Meeting held on January 23rd, the Board of Selectmen announced that Edie Twining was selected as Old Lyme's Citizen of the Year for 2022. Edie is very active serving the Town in a variety of capacities. Having served on the Economic Development Commission and currently as the Chair of the Halls Road Improvement Committee, Edie has worked tirelessly to develop the Halls Road Overlay District that, if approved, will allow property owners along Halls Rd. greater flexibility to develop their properties. The Committee is also planning to rebuild the Bow Bridge, a pedestrian bridge over the Lieutenant River. Members of the Old Lyme Land Trust are pleased that Edie is on their Board. She has long been a steward of the Lohmann-Buck-Twining Preserve and serves as Co-Chair of the Trust's Outreach Committee. Edie brings to everything she does a keen eye for design. Her hand drawn illustrations of structures in the Old Lyme Historical Society's Walking Tour of Lyme St. brochure continue to delight local residents and history buffs alike. the Selectmen and the members of the Board of Finance. This is a complex task that takes over seven weeks to complete. The advent of the \$57 million school building project and the \$5 million Senior Center expansion, along with the current inflationary pressures will make the budget process challenging this year.

The Harbor Management members on the 36-1 Buttonball Rd. Committee, have agreed to fund a hydrographic study of Horse Neck Creek in an effort to determine if it is suitable to become a small boat launch. This would include analyzing whether a dock, ramp and float could be installed over the marsh and into the channel of the Creek. The Open Space Commission will likely work on analyzing whether the marsh in front of the property can support public access to the water. The Committee's work will be done when it submits its final report to the Board of Selectmen.

Town Counsel suggested that the Town and the abutting property owners might resolve their differences concerning the Tantummaheag Landing if they entered into mediation. It was thought the Attorney General's Office might furnish a mediator at no cost, but Counsel found this service is not available. The parties could each fund 50% of the cost of a professional mediator, but this suggestion has not progressed very far. We are hoping direct negotiation might work but the abutters continue to plant or place things on the Landing property and little progress is being made.

The Shoreline Gateway Committee has been evaluating the survey responses received from about 1,200 people. The Committee had scheduled a meeting on February 16th for residents and business owners to listen to the results of the survey and participate in a discussion about next steps.

Regional District 18 conducted a referendum on November 8th (Election Day) to ask the District voters whether or not to approve the issuance of bonds in the total amount of \$57.5 million to replace/repair HVAC systems in 4 of the 5 school buildings, upgrade various code issues and add classroom space to the Mile Creek School. The voters approved the question with 3,001 (57.7%) voting in favor and 2,200 (42.3%) opposed. The School Board has formed a 9 member Building Committee (plus 2 Alternates) that will refine the scope of the project and solicit bids for the project architect.

As was reported previously, the Town received American Rescue Plan funding in the amount of \$2,162,215, of which \$318,649 was used to fund 33 Economic Recovery Grants (\$10,000 or less each,) \$1,783,586 for 32 Community Initiative Grants (larger municipal and business grants,)



and \$60,000 for Social Services and administrative expenses. The Economic Recovery grants were fully disbursed in December and the Community Initiative Grants should be fully disbursed in February. These grants are providing a meaningful assistance for the Old Lyme recipients.

TOWN PROJECT UPDATES

Sound View Sidewalks: The sidewalk project (Hartford Ave. and Rte. 156) and the bus stop project are complete, except for some punch list items. The Town is holding over \$18,000 of retainage to insure all remaining work will be completed by Memorial Day.

Halls Rd. Improvement Committee: The Committee presented the Village District Overlay Zone to the Zoning Commission at the Public Hearing on January 9th. The Committee also received bids on December 14th for the design of the Bow Bridge over the Lt. River and its approaches. The three bids are: BSC Group \$429,900, Jacobson Engineering \$260,700 and AI Engineering \$148,500. The Committee will review the bids and report back to the Board of Selectman. There is an American Rescue Plan Act grant of \$135,000 available to offset the cost.

Sound View Sewers: To date, the effort to secure a significant federal or state grant has been unsuccessful. Officials from the three private beaches and the Town have spoken with Senators Blumenthal and Murphy, Congressman Courtney & Congresswoman Delaura, and Commissioner Boughton but, while we have been given hope, there have been no funding commitments. Newly elected State Senator Martha Marx met with some of us recently and said she will introduce legislation to help this longstanding and important project.

Senior Center Building Expansion: Our Architect, Point One Architects, continues to work on the schematic design for the expansion of the Senior Center. This work should conclude in the fall of 2023, at which point the project could go out to bid. As one might expect, current estimate for the project has increased considerably and is in now the range of \$5.2 million. There is a tandem effort to secure grant funding to offset the net cost to the Towns of Lyme and Old Lyme. Once actual construction begins, the Senior Center will be closed for about nine months and its activities will be relocated to other locations.

Ferry Rd. Sidewalk Replacement: The project engineer is finalizing the sidewalk design and cost estimates to replace the sidewalk and we hope to put the project out to bid in February. If the bids are acceptable (perhaps a big if,) the project could start in April and be completed in May of 2023.

Swan Brook Outlet: We are pleased to announce that the

first phase of the project, unclogging the west 36-inch drainage pipe under the Hawks Nest Beach Club beach, has been completed. This involved hiring a contractor with a huge truck with a large commercial pressure "jet" to blast the sand and vegetation plugging the pipe. The job was completed in one day, so now Machnik Bros. can replace the wood timber crib at the end of both pipes. We have a grant from the Town's American Rescue Plan Act funding that will cover the entire cost of the job.

VETERANS OF OLD LYME

The veterans of Old Lyme expressed their appreciation to the students, faculty, staff and the administration of Regional District 18 for hosting Veterans Day ceremonies at each of our five schools. Many Connecticut schools are not in session on Veterans Day, but our schools have a proud tradition of recognizing and honoring our vets and we thank you.

SOLID WASTE & RECYCLING COMMITTEE

The members of the Towns Solid Waste & Recycling Committee are pleased to announce that a used textile bin (similar to the various clothing bins seen around town) has been placed at the Transfer Station. Residents may deposit old, torn or unusable fabric items (clothing, bedding, rags – even old animal plush toys) in the bin. These are items that you would not put in the regular clothing bins. The Town will receive \$100 per ton for these items, so please reduce the amount of your refuse and help generate income for the Town.

FUNDS FOR SPECIFIC RECYCLING PURPOSES

You may know that the State of CT assesses a 5-cent charge on the sale of "nips" (the small airline liquor bottles.) This is not a deposit and each municipality in CT receives its share of the nip revenue. Unbelievably, the Town of Old Lyme received a check for the 5-cents collected during the six-month period ending 31 March 22 totaling \$2,900. That means 58,000 nips were sold by the 4 liquor stores in Old Lyme during that period. The check for the period ending 30 September 22 totaled \$4,660, which represents 93,200 nips! Admittedly, this covers the summer when we have lots of visitors, but this is truly amazing. The Committee must use the funds for specific recycling purposes.

Last, but not least, we bid farewell to Marylin Clarke, our Democratic Registrar and former Town Attorney who retired at the end of the year. Marylin served the Town for over 30 years. By Statute, Jennifer Datum succeeded Marylin as the Registrar and she resigned her position as our Social Services Director.

After interviewing four very capable people, Amy Bonatti was hired in January as our new Social Services Director.

Social Services

As spring approaches, Social Services expects to provide assistance with the **Renters' Rebate Program**.

State law provides a reimbursement program for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program. The application period runs from April 1 – October 1. Call the office

to schedule an appointment after April 1.

The VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) program offers free tax preparation services to individuals and families. Appointments are available through TVCCA at: 860-425-6597 or call Infoline at: 2-1-1 for more information.

Assessors Office

The Assessor would like to remind residents of Elderly Homeowners & Totally Disabled and Additional Veterans tax relief availability.

Applications are taken in the Assessor's Office beginning February 1 through May 15th. To qualify, recipients must have reached the age of 65 or older by Dec. 31st of the previous year (one spouse, if married) or be totally disabled as defined by the Social Security disability program. Eligibility is based on qualifying income requirements as set by the State of Connecticut. The 2022 qualifying income limits are \$40,300 for a single applicant and \$49,100 for a married couple. Applicants may not be receiving federal, state, county or municipal financial subsidy or aid.

An additional Veterans Exemption is available for those who meet the Homeowners and Veterans eligibility and income requirements. These filings are done every 2 years or if your income has changed significantly; if you are already in the program, you will receive a reminder letter if it is your application year. Please call Mickie x219 if you have any questions regarding application for this program.

TRANSFER STATION / LANDFILL HOURS

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker, should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers,) along with a driver's license and registration.

2023 Parking Pass "Beach Pass" Information

Just like last year, our parking permits will be hanging tags that can be moved among your vehicles. This means you'll be able to use the permit for any car registered to you or your family in Old Lyme.

PERMITS WILL BE AVAILABLE MAY 1ST

The cost is \$30 per permit. If you want to purchase a second pass, the fee is an additional \$45 for a second one (\$75 for two passes.) Limit 2 passes per household.

Permits will be sold by filling out the Parking Pass Application online at: www.oldlyme-ct.gov and mailing in check or money order to the First Selectman's Office, Att: Beach / Parking Pass, 52 Lyme Street, Old Lyme, CT 06371.

Be sure to provide the EXACT address that you would like your pass(es) mail to.

Please be prepared to follow the instructions on the Parking Pass Permit application form: provide proof of residency, payment (checks or money orders) and include a self-addressed, stamped envelope. Please make check payable to Town of Old Lyme.



Lyme-Old Lyme Student Inventors



Each year students from Lyme-Old Lyme Schools use their creativity to solve problems by participating in the Invention Convention. Thirty-three inventors from the fifth and seventh grades participated in the district-wide competition this year. Inventors created practical yet innovative ideas as simple as an apron that can hold a tablet or phone when using online recipes, to a new way to scan labels on packages to check for potential allergens.

This experiential STEM program prepares students to be part of a can-do culture and builds confidence, teaches public speaking, and promotes critical thinking and problem-solving skills. Inventors learn about the engineering and design process, create display boards, and give speeches to pitch their invention idea.

Thirteen community members served as judges including members of the Board of Education, staff at LYSB, town officials

from Lyme and Old Lyme, and members of the Mentoring Corps for Community Development. Participants were judged on the purpose and practicality of the invention, presentation skills, the evolution and prototype of the invention, demonstration of how the invention works, and their display board.

Ten inventors from Lyme-Old Lyme Schools will move forward to the regional competition, and possibly to the state and national competitions. Lyme-Old Lyme schools have had 17 inventors advance to the national competition since 2017.



"It is amazing to see the growth that the inventors demonstrate throughout the engineering process," explains Nila Kaczor, the teacher that directs the program. "It has been my pleasure and honor to work with so many young inventors."

Old Lyme Ambulance - Allergic Reactions

Allergic reactions are a very common result of a body's hypersensitive immune response to a substance that is normally harmless. Allergic reactions can be triggered by ingesting something (commonly peanuts / tree nuts, fish / shellfish, dairy, medication,) or touching items (commonly dairy, latex, plants). Allergic reactions can range anywhere from mild (sneezing, runny nose, rash) to severe and life-threatening reaction (anaphylaxis.)



If you have had a severe allergic reaction, you probably have been prescribed an EPI pen. We hope you never have to use them, but they are necessary to always carry on your person or close by. Spring is quickly approaching, and with it comes an increase of environmental allergens as well as insect and bee stings, so it is best to be prepared!

What is an EPI Pen?

An autoinjector device used to quickly deliver the medication epinephrine to someone who is experiencing anaphylaxis. Anaphylaxis is a severe and potentially life-threatening consequence of an allergic reaction.

What are symptoms of anaphylaxis?



Skin reactions (itching, hives, swelling on face, flushed / pale / clammy skin), low blood pressure, difficulty breathing, choking, sneezing, hoarseness, weak and rapid pulse rate, abdominal pain, vomiting, nausea, diarrhea, dizziness, confusion, or fainting.

When should an EPI pen be used?

When you have two or more of the above signs and symptoms.



How should an EPI pen be used?

1. Remember: **BLUE** to the sky, **ORANGE** to the thigh
2. Remove the blue top, jab firmly into mid outer thigh until you hear "the click"
3. The orange tip contains the hidden needle
4. Hold for 3 seconds, then withdraw
5. The orange cover will drop down and cover the needle for safety
6. Dispose of Pen and massage the injection site for 10 seconds

Remember!

When you reach for the EPI pen, simultaneously call 911. An ambulance will arrive accompanied by a paramedic to assess if a second EPI is indicated, then transport to nearest ER while monitoring vitals.

About three years ago, there was a shortage of EPI pens and all EMS responders had to be emergently trained in how to administer an IM (Intramuscular) injection. Therefore, both delivery systems are available in our ambulances and responder vehicles.

At Old Lyme Ambulance, we just had our refresher training on the administration of the EPI Pen, thanks to our Training Officer, Ray Belval.



CURBSIDE TRASH REMOVAL IS PERFORMED BY CWPM, 860-447-1473.

There is no trash pick-up on the following Holidays:

Christmas (Dec. 25,) New Year's (Jan. 1,) Memorial Day (last Monday in May), July 4th, Labor Day (first Monday in Sept.,) and Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in Nov.). Trash normally collected on Thanksgiving will be picked up the next day (Friday,) and regular Friday pickup will be picked up on Saturday. Please be advised that CWPM DOES NOT take off the same holidays as the Town does.

Please have trash container out at curbside by 6:00 am

on your assigned day. Containers should be three feet away from any other objects, such as mailboxes, cars, other containers, planters, etc. Please be mindful not to block breakdown/emergency lane with receptacle. Clearly mark your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans. Phone Michele Hayes at: 860-434-1605, ext. 212 with any additional trash removal questions that you may have.

Single stream curbside recycling pick-up is provided for clean bottles, cans, plastics and paper products co-mingled in the green recycling carts every week. Corrugated cardboard boxes need to be flattened for recycling. Transfer Station Information

TRANSFER STATION/LANDFILL HOURS

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday - Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers,) along with a driver's license and registration.

Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station: Residents can bring the following items to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road: computers (personal computers, mainframes, mid-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives,) power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

Recycling Area: No fees for the following items (with windshield sticker.)

*Waste Oil *Motor vehicle batteries *Small appliances (no freon) *Mattress & box springs *Covered and non-covered electronic devices *Fluorescent light bulbs * UPS (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

FEES APPLY FOR THE FOLLOWING:

Tires: Auto w/no rim \$6 each, Auto w/rim \$10 each, Light Truck \$10 each, Heavy Truck/Race Car \$13 each, Construction Equipment \$100 per tire. *No Retail or Wholesale Tire Outlets.*

Upholstered furniture: Large \$10 per item, Small \$5 per item; Carpet 8x10+ \$10 per item; 8x10 or less \$5 per item; Appliances with Freon: \$10 each, Propane tanks: tanks 20 pounds (grill size) \$3.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles will be charged by weight at 7.5 cents per pound or \$150 per ton. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$7.50. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition Debris.

Brush is charged on a per load basis with a \$5 minimum, 3 cents per pound or \$60 per ton. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.

Grass clippings are not allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.

Leaves: No commercial leaf disposal is allowed; minimum charge is \$5; Pickup truck or small trailer charge is \$15; larger vehicles/trailers - Charge determined by Town personnel. *Resident must empty and remove paper or plastic bags.*

Reduce Your Trash - Bring Your Old Textiles to the Transfer Station

Did you know that old clothes and fabrics that are no longer wearable or usable are worth money for our town?

Old Lyme has contracted with Bay State Textiles to take away our old fabrics. Look for the new white drop-off bin at Old Lyme Transfer Station - it accepts old clothes and other fabric materials that are beyond their useful lifecycle and can no longer be donated.

This includes all sorts of old clothing that is stained, ripped, beyond wear - socks, shirts, jackets, jeans - as well fabric remnants from sewing projects, plus old towels, sheets, curtains, cloth bags, small carpeting pieces, door mats and stuffed animals.

These materials can be repurposed into industrial fibers, insulation and other materials. Bay State Textiles currently pays towns \$100 per ton for the materials collected. Old Lyme is joining multiple other towns in Connecticut in participating in this program.

Here's what you do

Place your clean, dry textiles in a plastic bag, bring them to the

Transfer Station, pull up on the ramp and let the staff know you're there for the Bay State Textile Bin. They will direct you to the white bin - please do not leave any items on the ground outside of the bin.



Old Lyme's Solid Waste and Recycling Committee continues to look for ways we can reduce our total waste.

A Guide to Recycling

No Plastic Bags Allowed



Reconfirm the Safety of Your Home

After a long winter full of storms and cold, the arrival of spring is a welcome return of warm sunshine and natural beauty. As the flowers bloom outside, and as we spring forward after Daylight Savings Time, it's also a great time to check safety equipment in your home. According to the National Fire Protection Association, as many as 60% of deaths from home fires result from the homes lacking smoke alarms. Use the spring season to test your smoke alarm and its battery; if it makes a chirping sound, it

needs to be replaced as soon as possible. Along with smoke detectors, it's also recommended to check carbon monoxide detectors during the spring.

When spring cleaning, make sure you're keeping an eye on what you're using to clean. If you accidentally combine the wrong products or don't carefully read a warning label, you could put yourself in harm's way. Spring is also a good time to get rid of unwanted or expired medicines in your medicine cabinet. You can take them to prescription drop boxes, often available in police station lobbies, and in late April, police departments often hold regional drug take-back collection events.

One more valuable thing you can do during this period is to develop an emergency plan, or update it, as needed. The National Safety Council recommends every family have an emergency plan in the event of a natural disaster or other situation and to review it once per year, making spring a good time to reconfirm your plans.

Spring is in the air, and with it comes a sense of change. It's also a great time to reconfirm the safety of your home, ensuring you and your loved ones can enjoy the nice weather with peace of mind.

Ivoryton Playhouse as a pianist in Jesus Christ Superstar.

As an accomplished pianist, Todd worked with Michel LeGrand on Amour. LeGrand was so impressed that he arranged a three-year loan of the Steinway of Todd's choice. Todd has subsequently earned the honor of Steinway Artist, which entitles him access to the Steinway of his choice, at any venue!

Through the years Todd has built his career as a musical director on Broadway, supporting, at one point, seventeen shows over ten years. Some of his Broadway credits include Annie, Elton John's Lestat, Spamatol and 42nd Street to name a few. His secret to managing egos like Sir Elton John? "Treat the extraordinary as ordinary and treat the ordinary as extraordinary." In addition, Todd was the music director of the Radio City Christmas Spectacular for several seasons.

In 2007, Todd learned that Mrs. Putnam's home on Hamburg Cove was for sale. Although he maintains a residence in New York City, the pandemic of 2020 forced an acceleration of plans to relocate permanently to Lyme, while continuing to supervise shows remotely. Roman Holiday (an Audrey Hepburn movie with Cole Porter music) and Hans Christian Andersen (a re-work of the Danny Kaye movie) will both open in 2023.

Community leadership is something Todd learned locally when his father served as First Selectman in Essex, and he often holds charitable concerts to fill the gaps in music education, which has been declining since 1978 in urban school districts. Todd has called on his colleagues in show business to contribute their talent to these events.



Dreams may soothe and restore but can also reflect our uncertainties and fears. In addition to dreams we have during sleep, dreaming is a powerful metaphor for setting ambitions and cultivating creativity. We "dream up" desires, goals, new futures, and ideals. Phrases like the "American Dream" or "I Have a Dream," the refrain of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s, speech at the 1963 March on Washington, both reference national values and remind us of how inaccessible those ideals can still be.

Museums fulfill a special role with respect to

memory, preserving it by safeguarding artworks, which are by nature vessels of the past. Encountering artworks made at an earlier time but seen by us today reminds us that memories are

interpreted and understood differently by each generation, as we weigh our knowledge about the past with concerns in the present. The intertwining of past, present, and future carries through this exhibition, where artworks tied to themes such as reverie, nostalgia, the creative mind, identity formation, nightmares, the surreal, the American Dream, and collective memory have been shared as moments to reflect upon the connections between dreams and memories.

INSECTS ARE VITAL!

Insects – crawling and flying creatures around us, require more thought than when we are squashing them.

Fossil evidence indicates that the Class Insecta has been on Earth for over 400 million years, with an estimated 10 quintillion members, with over a million identified species and 80% of insect species yet to be discovered!

Insects represent over 90% of all animal

life forms on Earth. Even with those overwhelming numbers, insects may be severely threatened.

Remember the car windshield with a patina of squashed bugs from a summer drive with our parents? Although scientists have only sparse quantifiable statistics on their possible global decline, that evidence is alarming.

A German study over 27 years documented a decline in insect biomass of

over 75%! That one study indicates that 40% of all insect species are declining and that some 33% are endangered (That includes bees, butterflies, moths, beetles and dragonflies – but not mosquitos and cockroaches...sorry.)

A world without insect pollinators, insect decomposers, and food portends massive declines in birds, fish and mammals that depend on insects as their primary food source. Sadly, the major culprits of this massive decline point

to humans: Pesticides (insecticides), habitat loss (urbanization, industrialization, fragmentation), light pollution, intensive mono-crop agriculture, introduced species, and climate change.

WE MUST DO WHAT WE CAN

- Reduce pesticide use (*practice organic lawn care*),
- Reduce light pollution,
- Plant butterfly gardens,

- Reduce carbon emissions, and
- Support policies that improve habitat for insects (*No Mow May*.)

We can help the smallest, and perhaps most important, creatures on our planet.
